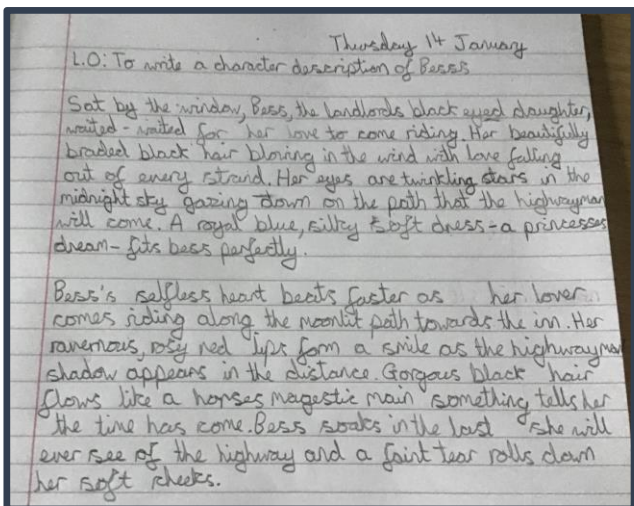

‘Gingerbread Week’ in Nursery Ducklings.

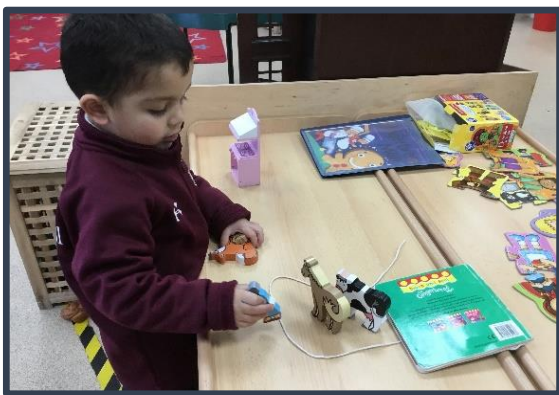
The children have explored all things ‘Gingerbread’ in Nursery Ducklings this week.

This is Scooby. His handler put something in a bag and hid it in the playground. Scooby was brought out and released and he sniffed out the bag in seconds. He was incredibly fast.

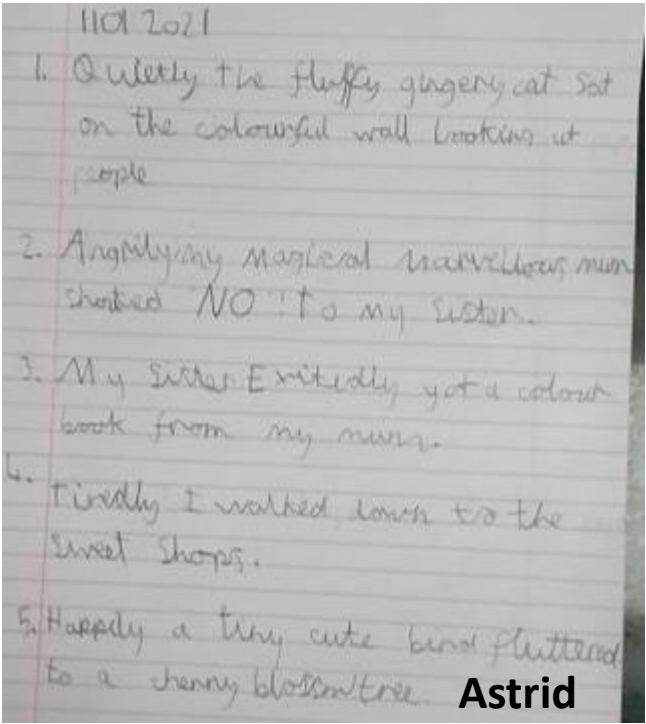


Year 3's Busy Week

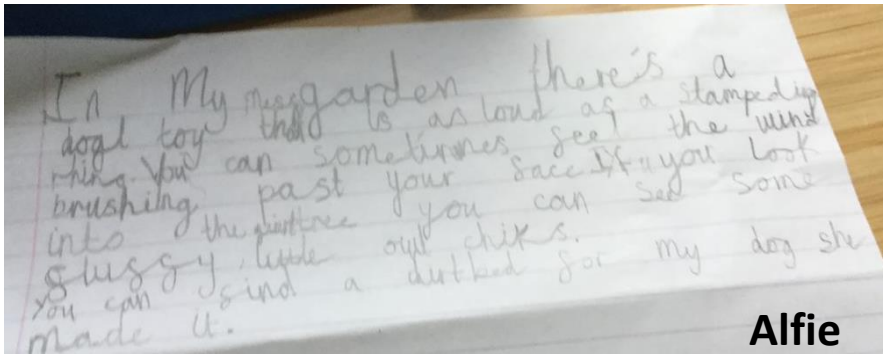
In Maths, Oliver created a monster using given measurements.



In English, Year 3 were focusing on using great description. They transformed some boring and plain sentences into super, splendid, scintillating sentences!

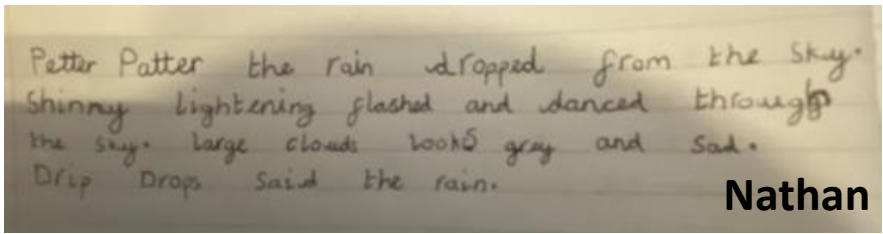

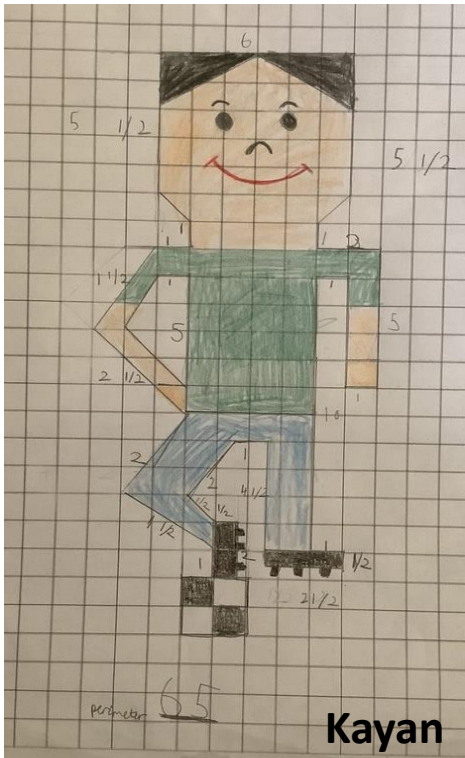

Here are Kayan and Molly's Perimeter People.

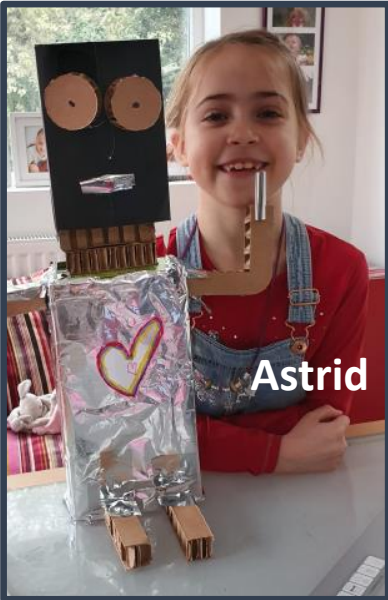

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Mr Hudson's Update on his 5 Day Charity Challenge



I wanted to let you all know that I successfully completed my charity challenge over the Christmas break. It took me about a week to recover but it went well and so far, I have raised over £6000 for 5 charities: Meningitis Now, MIND, Cancer Research, British Heart Foundation and STEPS (lower limb condition charity).

I certainly didn't break any records but I completed each day in the following times:

Day 1 (Climb the height of Ben Nevis) - **5 hours 55 minutes**

Day 2 (Row the channel) - **8 hours 37 minutes**

Day 3 - **Completed 1000 press-ups, sit ups and squats**

Day 4 (Cycle 100 miles) - **6 hours 5 minutes**

Day 5 (Run a marathon) - **5 hours 25 minutes**
