




The children developed their own role play and challenged themselves by making story maps.




Inspired by 'Going on a Bear Hunt', the children had incredible fun making Bear Puppets in their Art and DT lesson.

In Maths, the children have been exploring the **number 9**. They have made their own number books and investigated different ways to make 9.


















The children had a super visit to the Library.

They selected their materials based on last week's experiment, in which they discovered which materials were waterproof and could float.


















They tested each boat in water for 30 seconds and were thrilled to observe that everybody's boat could float.

Everyone is very excited to see what grows in Year 1!















Year 3's Gorilla Sequel






My sequel is about saving all the gorillas from the zoo.

Year 5 re-enact 'Hamlet' in Drama


In Year 5 this week, the children have been looking at 'Hamlet' as part of their Shakespeare topic in Drama.







Year 6 explore topic of Volume


In Maths this week, Year 6 have been exploring the topic of **volume**. They have been estimating and measuring the volume of containers.



The children have also been using and applying formula to calculate areas of cubes, cuboids and triangular prisms.












They have been investigating volume by drawing accurate 3D shapes to solve problems and applying their knowledge of volume to complete tarsia puzzles.


