Year 11 have been working through a range of assessments this week which will help their teachers to gain a deeper understanding of how they can support each pupil to successful outcomes next summer. Next week, Year 13 pupils will be completing their own assessments as they move forward with their university decisions and with the completion of their UCAS forms.

Year 7 enjoyed being outdoors in the sunshine for their Team Building Day on Monday, which helped them to think about the new friendships they are making within their tutor groups and classes.

Next Tuesday 29 September, Year 7 Parents will have the chance to meet with tutors to catch up on progress at their 'Meet the Tutor' event. This will also include workshops on Firefly for Parents, iPads and Blended Learning, Online Safety and Social Media.

As well as some great work in curriculum subjects, we have also seen many of our activities programme restarting including the CCF, Model United Nations, Music Ensembles and Food Clubs.

COVID-19 Update

Pupils have been very impressive in adapting to the wearing of face coverings in our corridors and communal spaces, I congratulate them for making 'Hands, Face, Space' a priority and helping to keep everyone in the Royal Russell community safe.

On Tuesday, in my last COVID-19 update, I set out our plans for our response should we have a positive COVID-19 test result within the Royal Russell staff or pupil community.

In this case, I know you will appreciate that it will take time to establish the close contact of any individual within the School, we may therefore ask the entire Year Group bubble to self-isolate for one day in the first instance, whilst we confirm the direct and extended close contacts.



Those identified as close contacts would then be asked to self-isolate for 14 days whilst other pupils who are not close contacts would be permitted to return to School.

The NHS has produced some guidance to help parents understand when their child can and cannot attend school which you may find useful <u>here</u>.

We have also been asked to make you aware of this letter from NHS Test and Trace.

May I take this opportunity to ask you to remind your children of the following points:

- 1. the importance of a thorough hand hygiene routine.
- 2. the importance of mask wearing, both according to our in-school protocols and also for those using public transport to and from the School. We have been advised this week by a member of the public that a small number of Royal Russell pupils using public buses have been observed not wearing masks for their journeys.
- 3. the importance of maintaining appropriate distance from all members of staff and pupils outside of their immediate Year Group 'bubble'.

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Year 7s Stem Club Success!

Year 7 STEM CLUB - 1.15pm Tuesday lunchtimes in S3 for Year 7 only.

- . Open to all Year 7s who want to experiment with Science or make models and understand the science of how they work.
- STEM stands for Science Technology Engineering and Maths and each week there will be science in an experiment, making models or designing prototypes for Technology and Engineering, and occasionally using some Maths.

This week, Year 7 raced their hovercrafts which were made from old CDs, bottle tops and balloons.

They learnt that a hovercraft works by forcing air out beneath it, creating a cushion of air to float on. As the CD is light enough, it doesn't need a large cushion or skirt as a life sized hovercraft normally has. The balloon acts as a pressurized gas chamber. When you open the bottle top, the balloon forces air out through the top, creating a thin cushion of air beneath the CD.

As the hovercraft is nudged it floats over the surface like an air hockey puck. That's because air hockey uses the same principle, with the puck floating on a layer of air but the air comes from holes in the table rather than above as in a hovercraft.



Year 7 Touch Typing

Y7 Touch Typing Club takes place on Wednesday lunchtimes with Mrs Tanner in C4. A funky programme is used demonstrate how to remember the keys and cardboard box covers the keyboard so that pupils can learn to type without looking.

All of the pupils enjoy learning this extremely valuable skill which will stay with them for the rest of their lives.
