Political Diary

Over the summer holidays

I would like you to keep a weekly political diary over the summer pointing out the key political events both within the UK and Internationally.

Within the UK

The major political story over the summer will continue to be about Covi – 19 and the government's response. How will the opposition succeed in highlighting any problems and how popular will be the government's response. Look out for

- Any action by Boris Johnson and his cabinet
- Developments within parties
- Any pressure group activities (strikes, demonstartions etc.)
- Any developments in Brexit discussions with the EU
- Any key votes in the Houses of Commons or Lords (although Parliament will be on holiday much of the summer)

International

The major international stories to look out for will focus on international reaction to Covid-19. Look to see whether countries are co-operating or not in response to the virus. Also look out for developments in USA – China relations, Syria and how Joe Biden is doing in USA. Any stories about international organisations such as G7, NATO, EU and UN could be significant. International issues to watch out for could be on climate change, human rights, new conflicts or action of poverty.
