

When I was in Form 2 or 3 a group of us were playing on the asphalt playground, quite innocently as I remember. Suddenly, a Cambridge prefect shouted at us to report to the Cambridge Prefects' Room . immediately! We lined up outside the room (there were about 6 of us) and the first one, not me, was called in. Seconds later we heard an almighty bang followed by shouting and screaming and the first boy came out in a hurry rubbing his backside, and he shot off somewhere.

The next one was called in and the same thing happened and similarly, when he came out we didn't have a chance to ask what on earth was happening. When my turn came, in I went and saw a number of Cambridge prefects there including Mochir, Millmore, Wilson 1, Lauwers and Long. One of them had a cricket bat and shouted at me to get my head under the table - there was no trial, just immediate execution. I got my head under the table and the bat was swung back. As it began its downward path Long, I think it was, hissed in my ear, "Now, yell like hell!". And 'crash!!' the bat thudded on to the cushion he had placed across my bum. "Now get out and don't tell the others!"

Silly, ain't it but it has remained with me all these years and even though I was in St Andrew's I had a lot of respect for those 'men'. Well, they seemed like men to me then! Happy Days!

BRIAN ANGEL RETURNS TO THE CLASSROOM

In last summer's newsletter we reported on the plans for the forthcoming new building in the school . Work is due to start this summer and should be completed by summer 2010. At the school we have been delighted to be introduced to an internationally acclaimed Finnish-American sculptor. Eino (see his website at www.eino.org for information about his work). As Old Russellians yourselves, you may be aware of the school's first Patron, Lord John Russell, twice Prime Minister of Britain and grandfather of Lord Bertram Russell. In 1964 Eino was commissioned to create a marble bust of Bertram Russell for a private collector in the US along with a bust of Albert Einstein. Eino will be resident in and around the school campus over a 6 month period sculpting a bronze bust of Lord Russell to be placed in the lobby of the new Reception area. The bust, in the initial, waxed, stage of work, was shown to Brian Angel, who had a lesson in sculpting from Eino in March this year.





On 18th March Eino's 7ft high bronze of Sir Roger Bannister's symbol of achievement depicting the moment Bannister became the first man to run the mile in under 4 minutes, in 1954, was sited for six months in the quadrangle of the Royal Russell School, opposite Oxford House. On 6th May - on the anniversary of this event - the sculpture was ceremoniously unveiled by Neil Speaight, the curent British No2, 1500m runner, in the presence of the Mayor of Croydon, Councillor Derek Millard. Neil Speaight presented the School with a signed running shirt, which is now on display in the Sports Hall.

I was intrigued to see the photo of Kindergarten 1, Hope Morley on page 3 of the Spring O.R. Newsletter. I can help with the identification of the boys in the photo. It is certainly James Brown at position 1, bottom row, L to R (and not me). Then comes Norma Harrison, then possibly me in position 3. I have several pictures like this of this era, all containing the same girls, but, unfortunately, I cannot remember who your missing girls are. I will ask a couple of my contemporaries with whom I am still in touch (Richard Holliday, Malcolm Sniders), to see if they know.



In the 'Cowboys and Indians' photo (above) James Brown is standing back row right, with me in the front row, position 1. I'm not certain who the others are. It could be John Allen in pos. 3. Like James Brown, John Allen had very fair hair, but was taller.

In the photo (below) back row, L to R are: James Brown, Leonard Shipley, ?, ?, Rodney Vincent. John Allen is in the middle row, pos. 3, and I am in the bottom row, pos. 4 (at the right end).

DID YOU KNOW ...

School 'Slanguage' can be found on the website, but did you know the origin of some of the words, such as this from Anthony Mak (1974-1982):

Bugs 'ole - I was told by several independent sources that St. Andrew's House received this nickname due to an outbreak of head lice that broke out in the 60s. I'm sure one of the O.R.s from that era can fill you in with more details!

John - I believe this slang was created by me and my group of friends (Zeki Murad, Brian Winstanley, and John Young). John Davies was our Technical Drawing teacher circa 77-80, and had a 'don't mess with me' attitude. His classes were excellent as he had very high standards. Consequently, he didn't give praise easily, but when he did it was always well deserved. Unfortunately, Mr Davies was a heavy smoker, so he had the tendency to make a short guttural exhaling of breath before talking (a kind of 'eh' sound). Therefore, when anybody did something exceptional, we would mimic his exhaling of breath followed by the word 'John' to convey the sense that the exceptional act would have been worthy of praise even from the great, John Davies. Simultaneously, we would sweep out our hand from our chest downwards in a chopping motion as if to cut-off any verbal dissent.
