Rosemary and I were delighted to hear that Mr & Mrs Hirschmann were married in the school chapel. It reminded us of our own wedding 50 years ago.

But first – a bit of history:

the O.R. Society.

During the war the junior school and senior girls were moved from Russell Hill School at Purley to 'Ballards' - as we called it because it is the name of the estate on which the current school stands - and the senior boys were moved from Ballards to Purley. The thinking behind this decision was that there were several Hurricane fighter squadrons based at Croydon airport, which could be very frightening for the juniors and girls. The irony of this was that more high explosive and incendiary bombs were dropped on Ballards than were dropped on the Purley school!

Because of our age difference this meant that Rosemary and I both spent the greater part of our time at Purley. Purley did not have a chapel, which meant Sunday Service was held at St Mark's Church in Woodcote – a 15 minute walk from school. The vicar was the Rev A C Raby, who was also the school chaplain.

So in 1956 we decided we would like to be married there as we had both attended there every Sunday – and we wanted the Rev A C Raby to marry us because he had led us both through our confirmation classes. By this time he had been promoted to Rev Canon and came down from Clapham specially to perform the ceremony – as it was going to be an O.R. Wedding!

On 24th March 1956, I, Keith Angel (1937-1944) married Rosemary Dennis (1943-1951). My brother, Brian Angel (1938-1947), was Best Man, Rosemary was given away by her brother, John Dennis (1935-1947). The bridesmaids were Pauline Liley (1943-1951 now Mrs Lea) and Pamela Barrable (1948-1953 now Mrs Turtle). The Ushers were Stan Costin (1917-1926) and Will Rushton (1926-1934) who came with his wife Louie Rushton (1924-1932 nee Hickman) and even the photographer was O.R. Alan Hockley (1934-1944). Other O.R.s among the guests were Peter Harrison (1938-1949), Harold King (1934-1938), Michael McBride (1937-1947), and Joan Williams (1937-1944 later Mrs McBride) – another O.R. Couple!

Also in 1956 Michael Ribbands (1946-1949) married Pamela Thorne (1941-1951 now Mrs Roberts) two months after us. Among their guests were Ann Evans (1946-1952 now Mrs Blight), Janet Baker (1945-1952 now Mrs Dolbear) and Alwyn Jones (1939-1948).

According to the records at the time, there were 13 O.R. Couples who had married before us. The first appears to be Albert Garnett (1877-1884) who married Amy Squire (1885-1890) and the latest was Peter Fraser (1937-1944) who married Brenda Waites (1935-1941).

It is worthy of note that most of these couples hardly knew each other as the senior boys and girls were in separate senior schools. They may never have met had it not been for a vibrant Old Russellians' Society. The one outstanding exception was Will and Louie Rushton who met in the Hope Morley House when they were 6 years old!

SCHOOL LIFE IN 1950 - By Richard Dadson (1947-1955)

WEEKDAYS - 7.15am - Chapel bell rung as 'réveille'. Dormitory prefects would waken all those pretending to be asleep and get them into the washroom. The upper Cambridge dormitory would be subjected to bedside PE under the instruction of Housemaster Christopher Tombleson! 'Fags' would clean their prefects shoes. (In the summer, when the weather was OK, there would be voluntary early morning swims in the pool in the woods, usually under the guidance of Mr Tombleson or, in his absence, Carrick Smith, the French

7.50 - Breakfast. Usually cereal, something hot and toast. Tea from an urn, usually well stewed. We were allowed to have our own supply of jam, marmite or whatever to supplement that provided.

8.20 - Bedmaking

8.30 - Visit to the nurse, if you felt ill or had any health problems. The clinic was on the ground floor of the main dormitory block, and the sanatorium on the top floor of the same

8.45 - Morning chapel. Hymn, bible reading (by day's duty prefect), prayer.

9.00 - Assembly in Great Hall as and when Head decided necessary.

9.00-9-15 - Two periods of lessons

10.30 - Break, PE by class on what was then the Quadrangle, Prefects from Duty Prefect's House would conduct a class each.

10.45 - Milk and biscuit (biscuit, NOT biscuits!)

11.00 - Lessons resume

12.40 - Prepare for lunch

1.00 - Lunch. Two course. We sat in Houses, always in the same seats. The tables are the same ones I've seen in the Dining Hall on recent visits, only with a more hygienic veneer on the top surface! Eight to each side, on benches, with a Full prefect at the head and a Junior Prefect at the foot. Food would be put on the table in large containers and served in portions by the prefect(s).

2.00 - Two more lessons

3.30 - End of lessons for the day

3.30 - 5.30 - Activities (see below)

5.45 - Tea. Bread & butter, jam, cake and tea (urn again!)

6.30 - 8.00 - Prep in classroom. Duty prefects keeping order, Duty Master wandering around.

8.15 - Hot drink and biscuit

8.45 - Lights out for Junior Dormitories (Forms 1,2 &3)

9.30 - Lights out for all others

(Note - Baths were taken once a week as per a prescribed rota!) In addition, a shower could be taken with permission, a privilege not that often taken!!

SATURDAYS - Mornings as above, including lessons until lunchtime. Sports in the afternoons. Prep in the evenings, as usual!!

SUNDAYS - Getting up, meals and bedtime as above. Morning Service at 10, allowing the Rev Greenaway to get to his parish service in Addington by 11! Evensong at 6.30 - pupils were allowed to arrange the format of, and to conduct, some of these. The one evening of the week when there was no prep.

AFTERNOON ACTIVITIES:

Monday - Cadet Corps (Queen's Regiment ACF), under Art Master William Wright, who held the rank of Captain.. Monday was also the day for the dentist to come. A beginning of term dental inspection would have revealed those scheduled to see the dentist - a most unpleasant experience under primitive conditions. Music lessons (private) would also excuse one or two from cadet corps.

Tuesday - Sports practice - Winter term - Soccer. Spring Term - Hockey (for Form 4 upwards) or soccer (Form 3 and below), Summer Term - cricket and/or athletics/swimming. Wednesday - Occasional inter-school matches, otherwise more organised sports training. Thursday - Exeat - for all those not 'gated'. Gatings could be authorised by both masters and prefects. A book was kept in the Head's office for gatings, giving names and offences!! Friday - as Tuesday. Friday was also the day of each class's PE session in the Gvm. Our PE teacher was named Squires, he was in his 70s, fitter than any of us and a retired circus clown. Every other week he was accompanied by an ex-boxer named Johnson, who was even older and 'taught' boxing.

Saturday - The usual day for inter-school matches. All those not playing were expected to spectate and cheer the Russell team! Duty masters soon caught up with any absentees! Sunday - We were all expected to do something. The choice was to go on a walk organised by the Duty Master - usually to Shirley and back through the woods, or to organise an informal game of soccer, hockey or cricket, according to the season. The organiser would usually be a senior boy, and he would often recruit off-duty masters or Jack Weeks (the groundsman in those days, and no mean player) to make up numbers. A hairdresser also visited monthly on Sundays and everyone had to have a trim.

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY SERVICE

As has now become tradition a member of the Old Russellians' Society is invited to lay a wreath on behalf of those former students who gave their lives in the world wars. It was

nice this year to have Karl Yabslev. our new chairman and his girlfriend, Sue, to follow both the CCF and Senior students in laving their wreath at the Memorial Garden. We were lucky that the weather was good and would encourage other Old Russellians to



think of joining us in our service of Remembrance in future years. The date and time of next year's service will be published in both the newsletter and on the
